Agribusiness: Decisions and Dollars (Print-Non-Fiction). Elliot, Jack. Delmar Publications (NEL), 1998. 330 p. ISBN 0-8273-6729-5 (\$55.00 hdc.).

Good farm accounting has become even more important in the global economy. This American resource provides a very thorough discussion of all the elements farmers will need for good financial management. A particular strength of the resource is its use of forms to track all the information a farmer must have and be able to process, in order to be successful. An index and a glossary are included.

Although this is an American program, the content is still relevant to Saskatchewan schools. Seven short programs, from 8-to-10 minutes each, profile several aspects about the safe operation of farm machinery. Some of the topics covered include tractor safety on the road and in the field, the reason for farm accidents and the safe use of hydraulics.

In addition to the standard chart on Canada's Food Guide, there is information about the amount of food Canadians consume, our changing eating habits, the affordability of food in Canada, the business of farming and what it takes to grow a hectare of wheat. The information on the charts provides excellent starting points for discussion.

As feedlots become the norm, the independent cattle producer is being forced out. The video provides an excellent examination of agri-business versus the family farm.

Indicators that describe more specific outcomes in terms of knowledge skills and attitudes are also provided. *Blueprint* provides a theoretical framework for the work study and career modules in all practical and applied arts courses.

Using an excellent combination of photographs, charts, maps and readable text, it provides answers to most agricultural questions. The farm profiles section takes a look at the different types of farming such as dairy, poultry, grain, hog and organic. This title also addresses environmental issues, the business side of farming and the human element. An index is included.

(CAN) This video outlines the value of canola to the agriculture industry and to the health of consumers.

(CAN) The student guide profiles 11 people with different careers in agriculture. The careers range from market analyst to molecular biologist to meat inspector. In addition to the profile, a sidebar provides additional information such as skills and education required, starting salary and the number of people currently employed in that field. The booklet is current, informative and attractive.

Agriculture and Food Science Facilitator's Guide offers 11 lessons dealing with the career opportunities profiled in the student guide. Each lesson provides objectives, an instruction outline and suggestions for further research or activities. Websites and a trivia challenge are included.

Careers in Agriculture: With an Environmental Focus (Video). University of Saskatchewan (SFN), 1998. 16 min. No order number is required. (\$FREE).

(SK) Through interviews with students at the College of Agriculture in Saskatoon and people working the field of agriculture, this program acknowledges the impact of agriculture, suggests solutions to problems and discusses new developments in agriculture. The students explain their programs and their reasons for pursuing this field of study. On site interviews are conducted with a research scientist, soil scientist and a soil management consultant. They answer questions relating to skills

needed for their jobs, what they like about their jobs, future considerations and the impact their careers have on the environment. Viewpoints from both genders are represented in this timely video.

(CAN) This resource provides 12 student-based activities and teacher background notes related to the Canadian agricultural industry. Topics covered include areas such as trends in the farming population, soil conservation, biotechnology and agriculture in the Canadian economy. Each activity is linked to curriculum, and strategies are suggested to make the best use of the background data presented.

Construction Safety Training System (CD-ROM). Saskatchewan Construction Safety Association (SKSA), 1999. (\$FREE).

(SK) This is an excellent software package designed to encourage greater safety awareness in the construction industry. The topic, the use of interactive video and the excellent production values make this program suitable for senior high school students. Twelve areas of safety are covered - from the law at work to protective equipment, workplace hazards, machinery and WHMIS. Each section has several lessons that encourage students to learn the new concepts through the use of interactive video. Following the study component, students can check their progress and then test their learning using the same program. One hundred percent accuracy of the 12 lessons is required to obtain a one-year safety certification from the Saskatchewan Construction Safety Association. The program is very flexible and teachers can choose to use just one of the modules, such as WHMIS, or all 12. Although the program can be used for independent study, it best

serves students when implemented as a teaching tool. The video can be paused at any point for discussion and further explanation.

The program is available free to schools by contacting the Saskatchewan Construction Safety Association. This organization can also provide information regarding training options.

(SK) Effective case studies are used to reinforce the importance of safety in the workplace. The stories of several Saskatchewan young people, who have been injured or killed on the job, are an effective backdrop to the rights and responsibilities students have in the workplace. Each case study has been re-enacted and includes interviews with the students who were injured or the parents of the young workers who died.

(CAN) As more and more young people start their first jobs, the rate of accidents and deaths is rapidly rising. This program features interviews with the parents of several teens who were killed or seriously injured shortly after starting their jobs. The need to ask questions related to safety before starting a job is stressed as are the rights and responsibilities of the employer and the

employee. This is an effective video that reinforces a strong safety message.

(CAN) Developed by Human Resources Development Canada, this resource can provide some excellent answers to students who are wondering about future careers and the skills they will need. Skills such as reading, writing, numeracy, oral communication, thinking, problem solving, working with others and computer use are all connected to 170 different occupations. Students can look up a particular career/occupation and see how each of the skills fits in, or they can look up the skill and receive a list of all the occupations that would make use of that skill. For example, if problem solving is entered as a skill it will list occupations such as mechanics, cosmetologists and carpenters. The program will then give examples of the types of problem solving that take place in each of these occupations. Students can then compare their skill levels with those that are
